BROTHERS LAUNGH AOG JET SKI PERFORMANCE POWERING UP PWCS WITH PASSION AND PRECISION

Meet Adrian and Oliver Martyna, ages 21 and 19 respectively, of Howard Beach, New York, the owners and founders of AOG Jet Ski Performance! At the ages of sixteen and fourteen their father bought them their first ever jet ski, a 2005 Sea-Doo GTX 155, nothing extravagant back in 2017, but for them, it was the epitome of beauty. However, the jet ski did not start, that's when the mechanical side of the brothers began to shine.

Adrian shared, "In the past, we always fixed our own dirt bikes and pedal bikes but had never repaired a jet ski. Nevertheless, we jumped right into figuring out the issues so we could ride it by summer. After multiple attempts at problem-solving, we still could not find the issue, but through research, discovered it was a relay. Once we fixed it and finally rode it, it was all history from there."

The search for broken jet skis we could fix began when we stumbled upon another Sea-Doo, a 2005 GTX Limited 215 with a ton of Riva racing goodies and a blown motor. Our father, who is also very mechanically inclined, saw this as no challenge and stated, 'let's whip out the manual and get to work." Once we learnt how to pull the motor, we tore it apart and put it back together with a milled head, new pistons, new head gasket, head studs, rods, and bearings. We water tested it and after we felt the acceleration of a supercharged Sea-Doo it was over from there! We wanted more speed and more jet skis to expand our minds to fix Yamahas and Kawasakis.

Now, 7 years later we have our business called AOG Jetski Performance where the A stands for Adrian, O for Oliver, and most importantly G for Gregory, our father."

PRD RIDER: What inspired you to start AOG Jetski Performance?

ADRIAN AND OLIVER MARTYNA: Inspiration to start our business was plucked from our determination. We became determined to be our customers' number one go-to PWC performance shop in the five boroughs and Long Island. AOG JETSKI PERFORMANCE

PR: What are some of the most popular products or services offered by AOG?

fum: The most popular services we offer and specialize in are Sea-Doo custom tuning, along with repairing Sea-Doos, Yamahas, and Kawasakis.

PR: What are you most proud of regarding your business?

Rum: Seeing our customers happy with the results of their jet skis makes us proud. Nothing beats a long day of work more than seeing our customers picking up their jet skis completed with love and desire. We may be young, but we take care of everyone's jet skis as if they were our own.

PR: Please tell us about your favorite riding locations.

Rum: A favorite riding route is from Jamaica Bay to the Statue of Liberty, followed by a stop at the restaurant Surf City in Hoboken, NJ. Passing through Coney Island and observing the amusement rides from the water is an incredible experience. The sight of the Verrazano Bridge and its sheer magnitude as you pass under creates a surreal feeling.

Let's have some fun!

PR: If you could only wear one color the rest of your life, what would it be?

ROM: Blue since we are constantly on the water. Water brings us peace and happiness.

PR: If you could swap lives with any cartoon character for a day, who would it be and why?

MDM: Oliver: SpongeBob because he is constantly in the water and enjoys every second of it no matter if it is good or bad. Adrian: Donald Duck because he loves getting on a jet ski and exploring marshes and going on long journeys.











SHRUN AND JACKSON MOTZOURIS: GENERATIONAL JET SKI BONDS

First cousins Shaun and Dustin Motzouris grew up in South Africa, immersed in stand-up jetski racing as kids competing in the same race meets. Dusty, 5 years older than Shaun, was great to race and train against. Shaun moved to Australia at age 14 where standup jet skiing wasn't a huge sport, so this part of his life took a back seat.

Shaun started riding at 8, the race scene in South Africa with no shortage of opportunity to get on the water. Living in Empangeni, South Africa, Richards Bay was a 30 minute drive with his grandfather and uncle owning a boat shop that provided engine servicing, fixing and the like.

Shaun's main motivation as a child was his dad, Mark who took the kids and skis every weekend to Richards Bay to ride until sundown. As he got older, Shaun competed in many races and showed huge promise of talent alongside cousins Dustin and Tyron Motzouris. Dustin was a huge motivator for Shaun, encouraging him to not give up and influencing the riding style he has today.

Fast forward quite a few years, a move across the ocean to Australia bought a Wave Blaster 3 and joined local races, Jetsport West. Every second weekend he chased buoys, trained, or raced.

In 2012 he bought an old Superjet and started riding standups again, his talent and knowledge exploded. There have been injuries along the way including a badly broken foot last year requiring hospitalization and surgery that put him out for 6 months. But nothing deters Shaun, he's back bigger and better, pulling higher flips, bigger rolls and looks so clean on the ski. Shaun's motivation these days is promoting the sport and making it an inclusive, tight knit community. He's passionate about the next generation getting into the sport especially his son, Jackson.



Shaun has competed in a few local competitions such as Rip and Ride in Lancelin and SCX (Sunny Coast Australia) last year where he unfortunately sent a huge flip and nosed dived the sandbank earning the "first to sink" award. In June he will give SCX another go and show the jet-ski community what he is made of!

Two years ago, Jackson embraced jet skiing, a passion inherited from his father. Together, they meticulously crafted Jackson's ski, forging a bond through the process. Confident in the surf, Jackson cherishes sunny days at Boranup Beach, sharing rides with his dad. He aspires to surpass his father's feats and eagerly anticipates his debut competition at SCX in the Novice division. Shaun, now riding a Krash Predator hull with a Dasa 850 engine, takes pride in customizing his equipment. Jackson, on a Krash foot rocket powered by a Yamaha 701, also benefits from Shaun's craftsmanship. Committed to supporting local businesses, Shaun endorses companies like 2MK Store, Noddy's Performance, and @_beyouneek, fostering a community of passionate sports enthusiasts.

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

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
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ro Rider recently caught up with 3-time World and 3-time National Champion and Broward Motorsports Race Team sponsor, entrepreneur extraordinaire and TV personality Sam Nehme.

PRO RIDER: "It's How You Get There" on the Discovery Channel showcases various unconventional modes of transportation and you are the star! How and when did you become involved with the show?

SAM NEHME: That's an interesting story! I met the producer of the show Max Wyler, about a year earlier. We had some good conversations but that was where it ended. We never actually spoke about the show or me being a host on the show. A year later Max reached out to me and asked if he could stop by Broward Motorsports to meet. We met and he explained how our conversation stuck with him and that I had the perfect personality and knowledge necessary to be on the show. I laughed and explained that I did not need a "JOB" I was super busy as it was. Max said he understood that BUT, added I would be able to promote Broward Motorsports on the show and we would even film some episodes at the dealerships. That is when he sold me on the idea! I felt the TV-time value for BMS was worth the work.

PR: How has your involvement in the show influenced your perspective on different forms of travel?

51: The show impacted me in many ways. Believe it or not, it was less on different forms of travel and more about what it takes behind the scenes to create a show. We traveled all over the US visiting all types of areas and terrain. From air to water, street to dirt, we pretty much tested, drove, and/or raced just about anything with an engine!

PR: What has been the most exciting, standout moment from the show that left a lasting impression on you?

So many moments come to mind. I shared some great times with Jen and Julian, my cohosts. They were amazing to film with and a ton of fun! The most memorable episode was the Toyota truck episode shot in the Vegas / Red Rock area. I crashed on my mountain bike that Sunday and ended up in the hospital with extensive damage to my shoulder. I had a 6am flight the next morning to film the Toyota episode. Wrapped up in a sling I knew I couldn't drive the trucks through the mountainous terrain in the dessert with one arm and bouncing around in the cab. I called my daughter and TOLD her she was flying out with me and would be on the TV show with me. Did I mention she would be doing all the action driving during the episode?! Long story short, we filmed that episode for 4 days and encountered some rather risky situations, but she was able to pull us out of them. The best part of filming was when the corporate guys from Toyota asked her to keep the four tires on the ground! All I thought when they walked away was "THAT'S MY GIRL!"

PR: How do you choose the destinations or modes of transportation featured on the show, and are there specific themes or stories you aim to highlight in future episodes?

SI: I don't have any control of what we are filming or driving. I get notified by the production team in advance of filming on where we are flying to and what we will be doing. I prep for that specific episode in advance, but we never know exactly what we are walking into until we are there.

BEHIND THE SCENES:

PR: Being a key player in the powersports industry, you've sponsored many winning racers and are an accomplished jet ski racing champion yourself. Can you share insights into what you look for in potential sponsored athletes and how you foster a culture of success within your racing teams?

SI: Racing has been part of my life since my first race at the age of 12. I have enjoyed the best years of racing in the 90s, along with highs and lows that have come with the sport over all these years. I've raced with the best and, most importantly, made many friends along the way. Although I haven't raced much the last couple years, my focus was our Broward Motorsports Race Team. We started our team in 2013 and have won a ton of championships. We have had the best racers in the sport on our team and developed some of the best racers today.

When I look to sponsor a racer, I consider different characteristics than most others do. I am always interested in having the most talented racer, of course, but more importantly, I want racers that have these attributes:

- · A good fit under our tent with the other team members. We are a family first under our tent.
- · Represents BMS well both on and off the track.

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

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

ailey began freestyle in 2014, taking third in his first competition. After watching jet ski racing, he was hooked, having raced karts since age 7. His first race ski was a 1200 Yamaha Blaster, as he wanted the same ski he had been riding for freestyle. He then switched to a Sea-Doo in 2015, getting an RXPX.

When asked about Bailey's most influential role models, trainers, and mentor, mom Tralee shared, "John Hollett from Sunshine Coast Powersports is an ex Pro Runabout Champion and is Bailey's mechanic, builds all Bailey's skis and mentors Bailey about the ski the course and the mental stress. Bailey also has another ex-champion Tony Grey who pushes him when training every weekend on the water. At the gym each week Dan from Arcadian knows what muscles to train for racing and pushes the endurance factor."

She continued, "When Bailey wants something he is determined to do everything to achieve that goal; he will ride through pain and save his pay cheque each week to pay for ski parts. He has raced for 10 years moved up by winning various categories in Australia and overseas to achieve Pro status, his determination and down to earth nature is one of many reasons.

He focuses on what he wants to achieve and has his vision and goals. He puts actions in place to achieve them, surrounding himself with supporters that mentor and believe in him. He trains at the gym 3-5 times a week and every weekend spends 8-9 hours on the water on a 1500 Kawasaki or a Kommander." We asked if there is something about Bailey people would be surprised to know, a funny quirk or unexpected hobby. "Bailey has a thing about the radio volume level, it must be on an even number. Bailey also used to play representative OzTag for many years (a noncontact sport that originated in Australia in the 1990s; a fast- paced game in which players wear shorts with Velcro patches, and the aim of the game is to remove the tags from their opponents' shorts while they are carrying the ball.) As a hobby loves to play around with the flatwater freestyle ski."

One of the best experiences ever was going to Sweden and spending time with mate Christian Cagnard and his family and getting to race the Nordic Championships.

Plans for 2024 and beyond:

Bailey is fully focused on the 2024 World Cup in Thailand for Pro GP Runabout and Endurance. While he would love to compete in all rounds of the World Cup, it is currently financially unfeasible for him, given he is based in Australia. He aims to compete in all rounds of the World Cup in 2025. Being in Australia presents logistical and travel challenges, including the expensive cost of shipping a ski, unfavorable exchange rates, and the high cost of flights and accommodation, making it difficult to participate in international racing series.

Bailey had the privilege of spending much of 2022 racing and staying in the USA with Jettribe, alongside his friend Bobby Cardone, 239 Raceboat, truly a memorable time for Bailey.

n the early dawn of personal watercraft history, few have left a mark as indelible as that of Bob Phares.

From the banks of Southern California rivers to the corporate corridors of Kawasaki, Bob's journey with jet skis spans decades, weaving his legacy into the fabric of this thrilling sport. Here is a tale of passion, innovation, and community - a true legend of the jet ski world.

EARLY YEARS: THE SEEDS OF A PIONEER

A Southern California native, Phares grew up immersed in the vibrant outdoor culture of Lakewood. THE CORPORATE CHAMPION

Bob's influence expanded when he joined Kawasaki's newly formed Jet Ski Division. Throughout the late 70s, he travelled across the United States, orchestrating promotional events and participating in boat shows coast to coast. His work helped popularize jet skiing, turning it from a niche hobby into a mainstream sport.

LEGACY AND CONTINUATION

After years of dedication, Bob chose to step back from frontline corporate promotion but never the sport itself. He continued to ride, compete, and eventually took over as general manager of a jet ski dealership.



powerboat champion, stunt icon, world fitness champion **SARAH DONOHUE OF THE UK**

SHARES CORE-CENTRIC FITNESS REGIMEN FOR POWER AND ENDURANCE

Discipline is key when it comes to any sport. I started in fitness as a child and swam for the county so training and discipline to training is second nature. I trained on military assault courses to better my all-round muscle endurance and won two world fitness titles one in Vegas and one in Tampa but the first thing you must have is the passion and desire to improve and the dedication to push through injury or tiredness. See them as a challenge not a weakness.

Being in the stunt/powerboat world isn't forgiving and if I have any injuries, I build the muscle around the injury to ensure protection against further problems. You also must understand the difference between the different pains. Is it a pain you can work through because it won't lead to damage or is it a pain which needs to heal? This is a real key issue on reaching the top of your game when it comes to performance. Do you know the difference? Have you even thought about this?

The key areas we rely on but don't often think about are core and neck and they are often overlooked.

When you race your body is tense as soon as you tense your core you are solid. Your core is everything. The G-Force of racing and wearing a crash helmet all take their toll and can have a negative effect especially later in life. Protect these areas early and build around them. I'm not saying get a 6 pack, less than 8% of men can even achieve one, and even less women and it's all down to diet, you don't have to be ripped to be strong, in fact most people that are ripped are weaker than their 'padded' friends.

1. TAKE THE 'PLANK' TO THE NEXT LEVEL

working the entire core plus chest, shoulders, and neck. Plank step ups. Start with 10 each side. Simply walk your hands onto the step and off again, keeping the core tight. End with 10 full push ups. Repeat 4x with 1 minute rest between sets.

2. SHOULDER SHRUGS. Hold and squeeze at the top for at least 3 seconds before you release. 20 reps x 4 sets. I use 2x25kg so guys you should be above that weight and girls below dependant on your baseline strength.

3. NECK FLEXORS / ROTATORS: YES & NO:

Lie on a bed on your back, head overhanging and let the top of your head fall vertical to the floor.

Nod 'YES': Slowly bring chin to chest and repeat.

'NO': Bring head level, left ear to left shoulder slowly, repeat right side, back to centre, back down and repeat.

Yes & No's gauge your own reps and sets — build it up. It isn't as easy as it sounds.
















Born and bred in Yorkshire to parents Stephen and Patricia, at 12 Sarah Donohue joined the infamous Oldham Theatre Workshop, birthplace to many UK top soap and movie stars.

Although not widely publicised, in earlier years, the only way to work in television was by holding an 'Equity' card, so the footings to Sarah's career in media stemmed from dancing at the world famous 'Moulin Rouge' in Paris. As a trained dancer, working at a cabaret venue was a sure way of becoming an equity member quickly.

With strict dance regimes and diets so all girls looked identical, followed by several seasons at the Raymond Review Cabaret in London's Soho, Sarah loved the stage lights so much, she remained as a professional showgirl for 6 years.

Whilst she danced at night as one of Europe's top showgirls head to toe in feathers and thick make-up, she worked for Granada Television by day as a presenter for the 'Men & Motors' channel in an era whereby never the twain shall meet.

Before life under professional lights, she studied fashion design at Manchester Uni's Toast Rack and had a long list of clients before boredom loomed calling for stage theatrics and extreme sports.

Most recently Sarah just finished filming 'Back in Action' as the stunt double for Cameron Diaz, to be released in 2024. Sarah specializes in all water stunts on, in and under the water and is fully insured and a qualified HSE Media Diver.

She recently spoke at the UK Dive Show in March 2024, and is featured in the February 2024 issue of Scuba Diver Magazine.

With a career in powerboat racing starting in 1993, it wasn't long before Sarah was racing in America from 2004 with Virgin Atlantic assisting her travel making sure she arrived ready to race! Richard Branson himself is a keen powerboat racer. But it wasn't just boats she became addicted to. She was short-listed for Formula Woman after being requested by Renault to try out for a new racing series.

This saw thousands of girls submit applications to become the next star of the track. Thousands became 12 with Sarah spending weeks on tracks around the UK being trained as a standby driver as she didn't quite make top 12, but that didn't deter her as Colin McRae opted to treat Sarah to a lesson in Rally driving telling her she would be more suited to rally than track after having raced offshore for so long.

Not all races end in glory as she was soon to find out. Sarah had a bad motorsports crash in 1999 leaving her on a life support machine, but it didn't stop her love for extreme sports and stunts. With her jaw still wired together from the accident and news stories and reenactments of the accident continually hitting international TV, even BBC's 999 and 'Ripley's Believe it or Not!' Nigel Mansell requested her as his co-presenter at the British Nautical Awards. A few years later Sarah worked in Venice doubling Angelina Jolie in The Tourist as her 'hero driver.'

Sarah is a keen marine conservation advocate, PADI rescue diver, freediver, stingray diver, author, and marine biologist in study, and was nominated as a 'Woman of Achievement' at 'Woman of the Year' in London, one of her proudest moments.

A marine conservation advocate, her passion is volunteering across the world helping maintain the health of oceans, corals and endangered species and hoping for a balance above and below our waters.


Sarah's biggest concern as she believes everyone's should be when it comes to our water, is the amount of plastic in the ocean which is killing marine life.

Sarah was the 1st female to sit on the judging panel at the 'British Nautical Awards' and is an advocate for women in male dominated sports.

Sarah has a keen interest in both electric cars and boats especially because of her marine conservation work.

UIM-ABP's Aquabike GP of Binh Dinh, Vietnam; a race site that was nothing but stone and water just 180 days prior to racing but then transformed into a hospitable and exciting venue for jet ski racing. Held against the stunning backdrop of Vietnam's coastal beauty, this event attracted top athletes, all determined to make this premiere location a marker for a record-setting 2024.

In Runabout GP 1, Swedish rider Samuel Johansson emerged as a dominant force on the water, finally taking a much-wanted GP win. He tied in points with last year's Runabout GP 1 world champion, Francois Medori, but his hard-won victory in Moto 2 cinched the title (by two seconds). Returner Marcus Jorgensen posted the best lap times in both motos. Jeremy Perez was in the podium mix but was thwarted by boat troubles. Joining Johansson and Medori on the podium was Gyorgy Kasza, who has been perfecting his race game in the last two years.

In Ski GP 1, Quinten Bossche was the undeniable champion, pushing through a tough four motos grabbing the hole shot, fastest lap times and the win in all four. Quinten had a point to prove this year, and he proved it irrevocably with a stunning ride. The second-place spot went to Kevin Reiterer who stayed in the top two in all three motos except for moto three, chasing third place podium sitter, Morgan Poret. Moto three was the decider for the third-place podium spot and it was between Morgan Poret and Oliver Koch Hansen, the latter of which was furiously chasing down Quinten Bossche with his best lap keeping just 1.9 seconds between him and the nineteen-time world champion. Morgan keeps his well-earned podium spot for third.

In Ski Ladies GP 1, it was an Estonian speedster who seized the crown-Jasmiin Ypraus on her new ski aptly named 'Dark Horse'. Jasmiin is a strategist and a planner, and there was no doubt she had plans for this stop to take another GP win for herself. Her main battle was with last year's world champion, Jessica Chavanne. Jessica, who has been enjoying a tremendous rise to the top, tied with Jasmiin in points heading into the third moto, holeshotting in all three motos, but sadly went off her boat in the third moto and was unable to rejoin the race. Joining Jasmiin on the podium was Estelle Poret in second, with a fabulous return after injury and young gun Benedicte Drange in third with a consistent performance in all three motos.

Meanwhile, in the Freestyle competition, the spotlight was on Emirati rider Rashid Al Mulla, whose remarkable talent and creativity dazzled the audience. Despite facing initial setbacks, his flawless execution of intricate maneuvers and gravity-defying stunts left spectators in awe. Contesting the title was Italian powerhouse Roberto Mariani who took second on the podium followed by Portuguese rider, Paulo Nunes, who graciously shared his boat with Al Mulla for this GP.

With Vietnam being a first for the Aquabike tour, we reflect on the graciousness of the host country with gratitude and awe. Vietnam is filled with energy and talent, and we have no doubt there is untapped talent waiting to explore what the world of jet ski racing can offer them. The Aquabike tour now looks to Sardinia in June as the second in their three-stop tour for the World Championship this year. **PR**

The 2024 edition witnessed reduced attrition rates, attributed to favorable racing conditions, with 30% attrition compared to the usual 50%.

The legendary awards banquet created by Mike Follmer, featured a sit-down dinner for 300 attendees and over 60 awards and trophies and a host of special awards that again surprised their worthy recipients.

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

Upgrade Your Pump Impeller - 101

he pump impeller serves as an internal "propeller" within the jet pump that draws water from the intake at the bottom of your craft and forces it out of the exit nozzle creating thrust for propulsion. Impeller "pitch" refers to the angle of the impeller blades which influence engine RPM along with acceleration and top speed. A lower pitch will increase engine RPM and a higher pitch will decrease engine RPM.

Most modern aftermarket impellers feature a variable pitch design that broadens the performance range. Variable pitch impellers are labeled to indicate the angle of the leading and trailing edge of the impeller blades (example 13/18). The leading edge influences holeshot acceleration and the trailing edge influences peak engine RPM and thus top speed.

The original factory pump impeller is generally a "middle of the road" design intended to match the stock engine performance. But, after a few rides on your new watercraft, you can easily find yourself wanting more than the stock impeller can provide. Especially if you are modifying your engine to increase performance. Upgrading to an aftermarket pump impeller is an easy way to improve your craft's holeshot and top speed. Manufacturers like Solas produce variable pitch impellers that deliver more efficient thrust. The variable pitch delivers much better performance compared to that of a standard straight pitch impeller. Solas impellers are manufactured with highstrength stainless steel that is polished to maximize flow. They feature an improved hub design and a special hub end seal to minimize cavitation for improved performance.

Solas works closely with RIVA Racing to design the optimum impeller pitch combination for a variety of applications. So how do you know which aftermarket impeller is the right one for you? There are several key factors to consider. Type of riding (recreational or competition), riding conditions (rough or smooth), load out (minimal or a lot of everything, including passengers), modifications (stock or highly modified) and altitude all play a big part in which impeller is the right choice.

PRO RIDER: As the Director of Skywave Rescue, overseeing safety and rescue operations at major jet ski events in Thailand, what inspired you to establish this organization, and how has it evolved over the years?

SUPRUAKEE SORMARJ: The starting point was to take advantage of the safety and speed of PWC. After we gained experience using PWC for flood rescue, we got acquainted with jet ski competitions. When an accident occurs, it is necessary to move swiftly. In addition to the winning outcomes of the competition, athlete safety is the highest priority. We collaborated with WGP#1, developing models and methods to help safely and quickly. Over the past 12 years, we worked in a variety of water sources with many skilled staff, gaining experience, improving our working patterns, choosing the right PWC and equipment, making our work always accepted by riders.

PR: With jet ski events becoming increasingly popular and competitive, what challenges does your team face ensuring the safety of participants and spectators in Thailand's diverse water conditions?

55: Our challenge is the increasing speed of the PWC and growing number of competitors, both newcomers and professionals. The Junior race has gained interest with lots of kids

participating. Our race site has river, swamp, and the sea, presenting dangerous water and weather conditions. Working, planning, and risk assessment is done jointly with WGP#1, Race Director, Tech Director, Medical Director, and Rescue Director so we can respond to risks to competitors and spectators.


Our company has been certified ISO9001:2015 quality management system since 2017.

*We have more than 12 years of working experience; development of knowledge and equipment at all times; all staff are professional rescuers; RWC and equipment owned, not rented; we have cycle maintenance and spare parts.

PR: What training is required for team members?

SS: Our 20 members (18 men, 2 women) are passionate about the work. Everyone has a regular job as a rescue officer in state and emergency team and has worked with the Skywave Rescue Team in the form of a part-time event. Team members receive training including basic life support+AED, EMT, lifeguards, dive rescue, RWC, power

boat rescue, firefighting, and technical rescue.



55: Skywave Rescue operates under the principle "We save life in seconds." Our highest priority is response time. Our SOP enables us to respond under that principle,

which is our reputation. The impressive event was a race where no one was injured. But motor sport, we can't prevent an accident, but we can get emergency personnel ready to take care of the accident.

In the JET SKI WORLD CUP 2019 Pattaya City, Thailand, rider in Novice Runabout Stoc, after a first-round start, passed through the tower and was turning right at buoy number 31; he fell and crashed by a following craft at the back and head, unconscious dropped their faces into the water. Every race site, we assess where and when to worry about the risk of an accident. We keep an eye on that point. We can reach the competitor within 10 seconds, help the rider to the medical post on shore within a few minutes, and help until they're safe.

In the WGP#1 WATERJET PRO TOUR 2023 Thailand Round 3 accident crashed in the PRO-AM RUNABOUT GP during the start lap. The outside gate was out of control. The vessel was blocked in front of the craft, causing a crash at speeds of more than 100 km/h, injuring both riders. Our team helped the riders within seconds and delivered them to the medical post within minutes. Both riders were safe.

PR: What are your team's plans for the rest of 2024?

55: 2024 is another challenging year for us. Normally, we supervise 25-30 competitions a year, 6 jetski racing, 4 powerboat racing, 6-10 triathlons and swimathons, 10 trail runs. This year, we just passed the WGP#1 WATERJET PRO TOUR 2024 jet ski competition, the first of four rounds and the OR Power Boat Grand Prix competition, with 3 more rounds, triathlons, and long-distance swimming competitions. We take time to train and review our knowledge annually. And we are exploring the possibility of providing safety services in the Asia region.

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FEMALES IN ACTION AND MOTORSPORTS:

ARE THE BOYS MAD?

n the fast-paced world of action and motorsports, women are rewriting the rules and redefining what it means to be a competitor on the track.
